## FROM THE DIRECTOR



Collaboration is an essential part of Headway of WNY's mission. Here is a recap of some of our recent exciting accomplishments:

On May 4, Headway of WNY collaborated with the Brain Injury Association and the Museum of disABILITY History to present a guided discussion on the topic of aging with brain injury. The presentation was held at the Museum of disABILITY History and featured panelists Dr. Thomas Polisoto and Dr. Lisa Keenan.

On June 22, Headway also collaborated with People Inc. and Catholic Charities on a symposium: Bridging the Gaps: WNY in Support of Veterans. This event was held at the Amherst Ramada and featured four panelists from the VA and veteran's organizations. The keynote address was provided by New York State Senator Robert Ortt, who is himself a veteran.

Both of these events were possible because of collaboration with fellow not-for-profits who share the mission of helping people with disabilities in our region. Collaboration and being a part of this community is essential; particularly due to limited grant opportunities, challenging economics and the large need for services in our community.

Headway has always been a collaborative agency, particularly in its work with the NYS Department of Health and the NHTD and TBI Waiver programs. These programs also brought about collaborations with six Western New York health and human services agencies, area

# INFORMATIVE AND INSPIRING VETERANS SYMPOSIUM

On June 22, Headway partnered with People Inc. and Catholic Charities Vision Military Program, and held a Veteran Symposium, Bridging the Gaps: Western New York in Support of Veterans. The symposium was held at the Ramada Hotel in Amherst. This event brought to bring together service providers and veterans, along with surrounding community members to identify key issues and service gaps for Western New York's veteran community.

The morning opened with inspiring words from New York State Senator Robert Ortt. Along with Senator Ortt, there were four expert panelists: Jim Becker, MFA from the Buffalo Vet Center; Kerry Donnelly, PhD, ABPP, from the WNY VA Healthcare System; David Shenk from Erie County Veterans Services; and Joe Chudoba from Erie County Sheriff's Office and Re-Boot Camp, Inc. who were all ready to answer questions on this matter.

With over 45 in attendance, the symposium was filled with an interactive and informational discussion. Topics such as mental health, suicide prevention, benefits, substance abuse treatment, child care, marriage and family counseling were all addressed and discussed. The symposium was an excellent networking opportunity that allowed agencies to connect with each other.

## HELMET SAFETY

BE SURE TO REPLACE YOUR HELMET IF IT WAS INVOLVED IN AN ACCIDENT OR FALL! YOUR HELMET ABSORBED MOST OF THE PREVIOUS IMPACT AND COULD BE COMPROMISED.

The following information is an excerpt from an article, "County law will mandate concussion training for youth sports coaches," that was in The Buffalo News, by Sandra Tan on June 22, 2016.

The Erie County Legislature is poised to approve a new law Thursday that will make concussion safety courses mandatory for all coaches of youth sports in Erie County. The law, which would take effect immediately, is expected to pass overwhelmingly just as schools are letting out and summer youth sports move into full swing.



Meanwhile, the Legislature also is slated to adopt the final component of County Executive Mark Poloncarz's lead prevention initiative, which would involve hiring more county employees to nearly double the number of environmental health inspections the county does now and improve services to children with high lead levels in their blood.

The concussion training law would fine youth sports organizations \$100 to \$200 if they cannot produce records showing that all of their coaches have taken concussion safety courses either in person, through their sports organizations, or online. The requirement would primarily affect smaller, independent youth organizations that engage in contact sports.

The proposal requires that coaches of any "contact or collision sports" take a free concussion safety program offered by the County Health Department or online through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's HEADS UP to Youth Sports.

"The state already mandates the coaches of public schools have this training," said Legislator Patrick Burke, D-Buffalo, who co-sponsored the law along with Majority Leader Joseph Lorigo, C-West Seneca. "It just seems crazy to me that not everyone is mandated to have this concussion training."

Though the new law would take effect immediately, Burke said he expects the county will give sports organizations a grace period prior to enforcement of the new requirements.

## UPDATE REGARDING TBI AND NHTD TRANSITION

The Department of Health has presented a draft proposed transition plan for both waiver programs. The plan has not been approved by CMS and is open to comment. This plan does include a role for the Regional Centers for which Headway has the Buffalo Regional contract.
